A Welcoming Environment for Families

As you plan a family read-aloud event, take time to consider how family-friendly your school or program is. The criteria listed below will help set the tone for your event and all year long.

Place a check mark ($\sqrt{}$) beside items you do well and a star (*) beside new ideas you want to explore or implement.

 Teachers, librarians or program staff consider parents, caregivers and family members an extended part of their teaching team.
 Teachers, librarians or program staff know children's and families' home backgrounds, interests and cultures and consider these when planning for children.
 Parents are welcome contributors of ideas and help plan activities for children.
 Displays and materials reflect the cultures of the families, their community, and their own homes.
 Display spaces reflect work and projects parents and children do together.
 There is comfortable seating space for parents.
 Books and other literacy materials are routinely provided to families for use at home.
 Books provided for children's and parents' use reflect families, their cultures, languages and the community.
 Parents and children have opportunities to read to each other and other participants in their native language.
 Frequent opportunities are provided for parents to read and interact with their children, or with small groups of children.
 Children and parents tell family stories and make up their own stories.
 Children's and parents' home languages are valued.
 The school or community library is often used and families are encouraged to check out books.
 Opportunities are provided for children to listen to books on tape recorded by parents or other family members.
 Oral tradition and storytelling are encouraged by inviting grandparents or community elders to share stories in their home languages or in English.
 Families and community members are invited to talk about their work.
 The various ways families celebrate holidays are respected.
 Accommodations are made for communicating with parents with special needs, low literacy or

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
